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What and how?

Wikipedia is virtually unique in helping people with very different perspectives develop a narrative that all can more or less live with.

How can we use this to reduce destructive conflict between

- Wikipedia editors and
- different groups in the totality of humanity?

Managing conflicts in Wikipedia

- "Wikipedia:RedWarn is a counter-vandalism tool, ... to revert problem edits, warn and report editors, request page protection..."
 - ***Concern: What's to limit its use for harassment / Wikihounding?***
- Asaf: Some conflict can be constructive,
 - but not if it goes too long.
 - It's better to set a time limit by which a decision will be made, and people can move on to other things.

Biased editing per Kitamura Sae

- The Japanese-language Wikipedia was unfairly accused of bias after different decisions in edit wars in English and Japanese Wikipedias.
- ~40 administrators for >1.27 million articles in the Japanese Wikipedia
- Solution: More editors & admins
- e.g., via a *workshop on Wikipedia at the 71st Annual Meeting of the Japanese Society of Western History.*

Biased editing per Deryck Chan

- w:pl:Gdańsk vs w:de:Danzig & edit wars > w:en:Gdańsk
- Hong Kong editors of the Cantonese Wikipedia were told they would be reported to the national security police ...
- WMF or Peace organizations: protect minorities: ***If authority censors Wikipedia, Wikipedia should censor them.***
- A language is a dialect with
 - an army and a navy (cf. Max Weinreich 1945).
 - a missionary and a dictionary (cf. Lüpke and Storch 2013)
 - an ISO 639 and a Wikipedia.

Broadening media coverage of societal conflicts

- WikiGap & WikiForHumanRights
- Documenting social movements thru Wikimedia (AR, CL, CO)
 - Dozens of workshops on Commons, Wikipedia, Wikidata
 - over a thousand new images
 - used in over a thousand articles,
 - tens of thousands of views,
 - offering the public a broader perspective of concerns, esp. re. violence by police
- Lea Volz: Research: How to make Wikipedia more welcoming?

New law regarding "terrorism"

- Terrorist Content Regulation in the European Union (EU)
- Passed using procedures that circumvented the usual open discussions.
 - *with teeth*
- May criminalize discussions of terrorism or "eco-terrorism"
 - ***Could seriously impact Wikipedia***

What's a "terrorist"?


- Terrorist: Someone who threatens the social status of those who control the money for the media. (Spencer Graves / User:DavidMCEddy)
- Documents declassified in 2016 establish that the US government knew in 1999 that Saudi government employees were preparing for something like the Sept. 11 attacks.
 - Wikipedia, "[The 28 pages](#)"

Terrorism research

- 2,996 killed in Sept. 11 attacks is less than one month's road kill on US highways (3,516 in 2001)
- US terrorist deaths (averaged 116 between 1970 and 2015) is less than
 - male breast cancer (~500 / yr)
 - drowning in bathtubs, hot tubs, spas (~335/yr)
- Wikiversity, "[Winning the War on Terror](#)"
 - ***Over 99.99% of those killed by US-led operations in Afghanistan and Iraq had nothing to do with 9-11.***
 - Few in the US understand this.

Effective approaches to terrorism

- The military is the *least* effective response to terrorism
- People everywhere believe in rule of law.
- People with power believe they are above the law.
- Community policing by US Special Forces worked in Afghanistan
- but does not sell high tech weapons.

Wiki Human Rights Project- Wikimedia Argentina

- ↪ In 2016 the first project was called **Wikilesa**. We created content on the process of Memory, Truth and Justice.
- ↪ **It was made in partnership with organisations as:** Canada Embassy, Parque de la Memoria, Dirección General de Verdad, Justicia y Reparación (Paraguay), Abuelas de Plaza de Mayo, Madres de Plaza de Mayo, CELS, Coalición Internacional de Sitios de Conciencia, Museo de Memoria Histórica de Colombia - CNMH, Memoria Abierta, Amnistía Argentina, Paraguay and Chile, national and regional universities, among others.
- ↪ **Democratization of justice:** Wiki Human Rights activities helps to democratize access to legal information and get experts involved.
- ↪ **2018 and 2019 Wiki Human Rights** was carried out in 7 countries in Latin America. We edited beyond the notion of crimes against humanity and addressed other human rights topics.
- ↪ **2019- 2020 milestones**
 - ↪ 1st edit-a-thon on Gender and Sexual Diversity with OHCHR
 - ↪ **1st Human Rights International Conference within the Wikimedia Movement**, hosted by Wikimedia Argentina in partner with Abuelas de Plaza de Mayo and IPPDH-Mercosur
 - ↪ **Wiki For Human Rights Campaign** coordinated with Wikimedia Foundation and Wikimedia Argentina in the 71st anniversary of the Universal Declaration of Human Rights

Why do we work with a Human Rights Perspective in Latin America and the caribbean?

Because we consider that:

- ↪Free Knowledge is a Human Right
- ↪ Human rights belong to all of us, without distinction.
- ↪People have the right to construct their own history, from their own context.
These projects give the civil society the chance to build its own history.
- ↪ Historical memory also belongs to people. A society with historical memory is a more democratic society.

Documenting social movements: the case of 2019 Chilean riots in Wikimedia

- Oct 2019: series of spontaneous protests across the major cities with a common critic towards the Chilean political and economical system. These protests ended with a total constitutional change.
- Lots of people began to document those events and share them through social media; local Wikimedians did the same but using Wikimedia Commons.
- Four main reasons that motivated them: (1) recognizing the importance of this moment (2) building counter-hegemonic narratives to those from the mainstream media (3) reporting police violences against the protesters (4) creating protests related relevant and useful information.
- How we helped? Creating a open social media campaign to engage local contributors -from the Wikimedia movement and beyond.

We helped to collect +250 images from the firsts days of the protests.

Documenting social movements: the case of 2019 Chilean riots in Wikimedia

- March 2020: we relaunched the project as a photo contest [Los 6 meses que cambiaron Chile](#).
- We received almost 400 images.
- We used those images to improve Wikipedia articles across different languages.

Our community had continued editing protests related content (and their outcomes) to provide quality and updated information.
