Purpose of the award

- Encourages paediatricians who are not active in research to undertake a study of a rare disease or condition which affects children and which addresses a question of clinical or public health importance.
- Enables paediatricians to further develop their research knowledge skills.

Who's eligible?

Applicants must:

- be members of the Royal College of Paediatrics and Child Health (RCPCH) and
- be a paediatrician working (at least part of their time) in the NHS who is a:
 - a) speciality trainee (any grade), academic trainee, or
 - b) new consultant (within three years of appointment to a consultant post)

The candidate must not have previously led a BPSU study.

The study team must not have previously submitted an application on the same topic for consideration by the BPSU scientific committee. Any one candidate may only submit one application per year. Joint applications (i.e. where two applicants on a BPSU study under supervision and share the award) are acceptable.
